"around here" the fire (said "far") trucks go out to fight and put out "afar". Enough for a public service announcement from Smokey Bear and the resident redneck. Time to ramble:

A petite grandmother from Greenville County, SC enjoyed having animals. Within the last month she was rushed to the hospital with broken ribs, other broken bones and a punctured lung to go along with additional bruising and trauma. She was attacked by her pet ram. I do not know the breed but I doubt if it was a St. Croix. But all sheep breeders and want-to-be breeders please take note; this is a refresher course and a stark reminder. There are breeds of sheep known for aggressive rams. Never forget it. I have never found St. Croix rams to be aggressive but some owners have discussed it in their situations. If you bottle feed a ram lamb or if you give or sell a ram lamb to friends and neighbors to bottle feed there is a strong chance that the ram will have less or no fear of you or them when it is mature and will treat a human as a peer to the point of aggressive behavior. If you try to buddy up with your ram, if you keep him by himself and check on him like a dog to pet and pamper, please remember. We all like our sheep and think that little "Lamb Chop" or "Baa Baa" is cute but when the hormones kick in the cuteness can vanish. Always remember. Never forget.

Proper handling facilities: These are the best dollars you can spend and it does not have to be expensive. Make a chute or run with a few boards, two pieces of plywood, two hog panels or a wall and a panel and also have some sort of stop or gate on both ends.

Why? Another warning: If you crowd sheep into a narrow room or horse stall and do not realize that their #1 fright response is to run, you are standing in the only exit that the sheep can imagine, then the sheep will go by you, through your legs, over your shoulders or ram you in the torso (very hard on glasses in your shirt pocket not to mention the body) because to escape is to live. Don't learn to hate working sheep because you are not prepared. **Prepare.**

Networking: Have you ever called or emailed the St. Croix breeder who lives the closest to you or in an area where you might travel? You can find them on the website or even call a director and find out folks in your area, state or region. Do you try to find ways to get sheep to folks in distant locations who either want to start with our breed, need a new ram or just want to see what a St. Croix looks like? We have a few breeders in our local area that I know well enough to know that their sheep are quality animals, are well cared for and are probably disease free without a lot of in and out on the farms from sale barn sheep and such. Most are registered and some are commercial St. Croix sheep. There are needs and buyers for both but, if at all possible, please keep quality sheep registered for the good of the breed and for your long term economic benefit. When a potential sheep person calls me and I cannot help them or they are a long ways away I try to recommend a breeder closer to them or call the local breeders and see what is available. It can be a win-win sometimes. I helped one breeder sell all of his lamb crop last year and the buyer of the ewe lambs needed a ram of different breeding. I was able to meet them at

the local farm and deliver the ram to the buyers as they picked up the ewe lambs without them making a second 3 hour trip. The nearest sheep person you have never met is only a phone call or an email away. Give it a try and enjoy a common interest.

How sheep are handled on a daily basis: I had a friend to coin and use a new term the other day that I really liked. He said his sheep were "pasture wild". What he meant was that he had another job, did not baby his sheep and manages them like commercial sheep out in a pasture with guard animals. His sheep were not "wild-wild" but were not used to petting, small pens, coming up to see him every day, getting daily treats, etc. Researchers have also found that sheep, the animals created to be dumb by so many, can remember and recognize people individually by their faces. Hey, not so dumb, huh? Here on the farm, we also do not pet our sheep, they are mainly accustomed to only me and will come up to check me out but when people come (and for some reason especially when children come) the sheep will act like they are seeing ravenous wolves. I don't pretend to understand. It is amazing the difference of their behavior from the normally familiar person(s) versus a different number of people, a visitor or a different sized person or a child can make. I cannot explain it but it is what it is. The only reason to mention this is to discuss temperament of St. Croix sheep. Some can be naturally "dog gentle" and some can be stand-offish. That is totally different and tied to an individual animal's temperament. But if you go to look at sheep and are concerned about the temperament, please remember that the sheep can have reasons to act certain ways. Ask how they are handled, how often they are handled, how often they are hand fed and such. Short term hand feeding can turn the wary sheep around in no time. It's just what they get used to, it seems. I find this to be pretty interesting. But let's wind up the rambling:

Annual Meeting: If you still feel isolated, if you want to get the word out about the benefits and strengths of St. Croix sheep, if you want to meet other St. Croix breeders, you don't have to feel that way anymore! In 2017 SCHSB had an online or teleconference annual meeting. It went very well and the guest speakers were relevant and helpful. This year we will be having the 2018 SCHSB annual meeting in Springfield, MO coinciding with the Ozark Farm Fest. It is an opportunity to be in the middle of the USA, in a "sheep region" where there are already established hair sheep flocks in the form of Katahdins and will also allow SCHSB members up to three days at the festival to visit with each other and meet farm folks to discuss how the St. Croix breed can fit onto farms, including existing cattle operations or improve the commercial sheep flocks in the Ozark region or anywhere. There will be more articles in this edition of News and Views with details, but will you please consider joining us for at least a day, two or three, or to drop in and say "Hi"? If you can attend and want to support the St. Croix breed, please let a director or officer know so that we can schedule you to help greet folks at the pens and table and discuss the breed's advantages. I want to meet you and I hope to see you there. For me, meeting members face to face is a real treat. As the old saying goes, "It puts a face with a name" but it also builds a deeper relationship to help when we discuss things, email or talk about things
